

#### Resting Elk

A.k.a. Mount Lion, Puma, Panther and Catamount (cat of the mountain) to name a few.

Typical size is 6 - 71/2 feet long including 2 - 3 feet of tail. Their weight ranges from 75 -175 lbs. with females at the lower end and males at the upper end of the range. The largest recorded male taken from the wild was 276 lb., 8' 7 3/4" from Arizona in 1917. Another notably large specimen was a Colorado cat taken by Theodore Roosevelt in 1901. It weighed in at 227 lbs. and 8 feet long. It is still on display at the National Museum of Natural History in Washington D.C.

Their present range is southeast

Alaska, through Canada's western provinces, downthrough our western states. Mexico. Central America and most of South America. There is also a small population in Florida. Are there Cougars in Michigan now? That depends on who you talk to. The last official Michigan cougar was killed near Newberry in 1906.

Within that range their habitat is thick forest to desert brush and rocks. The key element it needs is cover of any sort for its ambush style hunting technique. Their favorite prey is deer but will also take small game and elk.

Although breeding can take place anytime of the year, it is timed so most kittens are born in the summer.

Following a gestation of 90 to 96 days the female gives birth to two to three kittens weighing about a pound each. Their eyes open in 10 to 14 days and change from blue to golden colored at about 16 months.

Although "Black Panthers" and albino cougars have been reported, there has been no documentation.

The North American population is 10,000 to 50,000. Why such a wide estimate? Some experts describe counting cougars like trying to count fish in the ocean. Their secretive lifestyle makes an accurate census very difficult.


